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### **Urban Governance and Its Discontents**

On 18-19 February, the <u>Urban Governance and its Discontents</u> conference was held at St Anne's College, University of Oxford. A cornerstone initiative of the <u>Oxford Programme for the Future of Cities</u>, this event proposed a new format for presenting and elaborating thinking on what urban governance does, when it succeeds and fails, and how it can be re-organised to meet the challenges of the 21st century. Academics on the cutting edge of global urban scholarship were put face-to-face with established innovative practitioners - architects, activists, policy makers, and artists - in a series of public dialogues or debates. Each debate was preceded by a small panel of academics and practitioners presenting papers that speak to the same key issues. The entire event was extremely well received by the over 150 students, academics and practitioners who attended.

This event was sponsored by Oxford Programme for the Future of Cities, All Souls College, and the Urban Transformations Group.

### **New Currents in Science: The Challenges of Quality**

On 3 and 4 March InSIS members Jerome Ravetz, Peter Healey and Christiaan de Koning participated in the workshop "New Currents in Science: The Challenges of Quality". The workshop was organised and hosted by the <u>European Commission's Joint Research Centre</u> (JRC) in Ispra, Italy. One of the key themes throughout the workshop was "Post-normal science".

The session was opened by Vladimir Šucha, Director-General of the JRC. Christiaan's presentation was titled "The 'new' science? Genome editing: between open society of science and anarchy", and Peter discussed "The four distinct challenges of quality".

The event was attended by a global audience of academics, policy makers, and social activists, and was broadcast live within the European Commission.

### Prof Rayner speaks on the Paris Climate Change agreement

On 22 February InSIS Director Prof Steve Rayner gave a keynote address as part of the roundtable discussion "Road from Paris: Ensuring effective and equitable climate action" in New Delhi. Organised by the Observer Research Foundation (ORF), one of India's largest multidisciplinary think tanks, the roundtable explored the implications of the Paris climate change agreement.

# **Climate Change Communication workshop**

On 8 March InSIS researcher Dr Sophie Haines participated in a <a href="ESRC/Climate Outreach">ESRC/Climate Outreach</a> workshop on "Climate Change Communication and Public Engagement" as part of her current work under the IMPETUS project, which is funded under the <a href="NERC">NERC</a> UK Droughts and Water Scarcity programme. The workshop brought together researchers from climate-related ESRC projects to share good practice in communication and public engagement.
