InSIS Welcomes Louise Bezuidenhout and Sara de Wit

InSIS is happy to welcome two new Postdoctoral research fellows, <u>Louise Bezuidenhout</u> and <u>Sara de Wit</u>. Louise holds a PhD in Sociology from the University of Exeter (UK, 2014) and an MA in bioethics from KU Leuven (Belgium, 2008). Her research interests are broadly centred on data sharing issues within the life sciences. Louise will be working on the new InSIS research project '<u>Changing Ecologies of Knowledge and Action'</u> (CEKA). Sara is trained in anthropology and African Studies and a has a strong empirical orientation, with long-term fieldwork experience. Her research has broadly focused on globally circulating ideas such as climate change and notions of development travel. Sara joins InSIS as part of the 'Forecasts for Anticipatory Humanitarian Action' (FATHUM) project.

New Institutional Links project on Zika

Javier Lezaun has been awarded a British Council/Newton Fund grant to research the ongoing Zika virus epidemic in Brazil. The project will be conducted in collaboration with researchers at the <u>Oswaldo Cruz Foundation</u> in Brazil (Fiocruz), and will study the response of public health research institutions to the emergence of a new infectious disease, as well as the translation of scientific knowledge into novel forms of vector control and clinical care. The project will be launched in April and will extend until the summer of 2019.

Sophie Haines at the meeting of the Society for Applied Anthropology

Steve Rayner was interviewed in the BBC 2 Documentary "The Cult Next Door" shown on 26th January. The cult in question was the 1970's Workers' Institute of Marxism-Leninism Mao Zedong Thought, which was the subject of Steve's 1982 paper "The Perception of Time and Space in Egalitarian Sects: A Millenarian Cosmology" in M. Douglas (ed) Essays in the Sociology of Perception. Recent interest in the group has been prompted by the jailing of its leader on sexual abuse charges related to the long-term confinement of former members and his own daughter in a South London flat.
